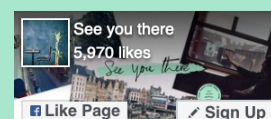


BRUSSELS GALLERY WEEKEND 2021: 10 SHOWS YOU SHOULDN'T MISS

Clay and yarn are the dominating materials in this fascinating group exhibition featuring no less than 26 different artists. [“The Sowers”](#) at [Fondation Thalie](#) explores the multilayered meanings of these two natural materials, touching upon rituals, crafts, recycling, a universal ecological consciousness, and spirituality. While [Gabriel Chaile](#)'s pigments on charcoal drawings serve as a vehicle for his research into the indigenous cultures of South America, [Julie Monot](#) will perform “Before It Was Water”, wearing a hand-crafted kimono bearing motifs inspired by various types of single-celled organisms. With works by [Elise Peroi](#), [Belinda Blignaut](#), [Desire Moheb-Zandi](#), and many others.
